Although none of the nine nuclear weapons states has signed onto the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, on October 24. 2020. this Treatv

reached the required number of ratifications for its entry into force. The three nations that took it over the 50-state line were Honduras, Jamaica and Nauru.

The Treaty will become effective 90 days after the October 24, 2020 date and nuclear weapons will be prohibited weapons of mass destruction, just like chemical weapons and biological weapons.

Unfortunately, U.N. laws



are too often NOT enforced. Although this Treaty will certainly be no exception. should the horror of another use of nuclear weapons occur. it will be an illegal use. Illegal is illegal.

...but the US Is Still Addicted to Nukes

Latest defense spending news from Peace Action's affiliate list

The Pentagon has raised to **\$95.8 billion** the estimated cost of fielding a new fleet of land-based nuclear missiles to replace the Minuteman 3 arsenal that has operated continuously for 50 years. The estimate has increased about \$10 billion from four years ago. The new intercontinental ballistic missiles, or ICBMs, are part of a near-total replacement of the American nuclear force over the next few decades at a total cost of more than \$1.2 trillion.

Last month the Air Force awarded Northrop Grumman a \$13.3 billion contract for engineering and manufacturing development of the new missiles. The total "lifecycle" cost, including operating and sustaining the missiles over their expected lifetime is set at \$263.9 billion.

The current fleet of 400 missiles, each one armed with a single nuclear warhead, is based in underground silos in Montana, (Cont. on p. 4)

Threat of Vote Suppression in 2020

Voting in federal elections in the United States basically means choosing either the Republican Party candidate or the Democratic Party candidate. When a so-called 3^{rd} party presidential candidate has traction – e.g., Ralph Nader in 2000 and Jill Stein in 2016

-- they get blamed for the losing party's loss. Two-party elections bear some similarities to team sports and just as teams seek any advantage to win, so do political parties. For political parties, one way is vote suppression.

There are two different categories of vote suppression. One involves actions or activities intended to discourage/prevent eligible voters from even casting a ballot. The other involves situations and processes that dilute or even nullify the impact of how voters voted.

Discouraging/preventing voting are things like poll taxes, overzealous purging of voter rolls, shortening the days and hours of early voting, hourslong waits at polling places in certain neighborhoods, etc. Discriminatory impediments and hurdles. Tools of past and present racism.

One way to lessen the impact of votes actually cast is something both major political parties scramble to do every decade after the census: Gerrymender, i.e., (re)configure congressional districts into really bizarre shapes to their advantage.



A more frequent, but perhaps less obvious example of how voters' votes get diluted or even nullified, is influence: dark money (i.e., big amounts of mystery donor money), big money donors whose identity is known, special interest groups, lobbyists, etc. When that happens, the candidate for House of Representatives and/or the Senate will really be working for some entity other than for the voters who elected them.

There are differences and

similarities, between the who/ what/how of court appointments and the who/what/how of presidential and congressional election candidates, but on the 2nd day of Senate Judiciary Committee hearings, Senator Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI) used his allotted 30 minutes to give hearing viewers a lesson

about who, what and how this works in regard to lifetime federal judge and justice appointments. (Look for the video "Sen. Whitehouse Speaks at the 2nd Day of Hearing for Judge Barrett in the Judiciary Committee" at <u>https:</u> //www.whitehouse.sena te.gov/news/videos)

In 2020, the Supreme Court

changed dramatically. Plus, of course, it's a presidential election year. Add to that, that it's a census year. Although the Trump administration did not ultimately include a citizenship question on the census, in early October, the Supreme Court, in an 8-1 ruling (Justice Sonia Sotomayor), permitted the Trump administration to cut short the census reporting period. This will almost certainly result in an undercount of persons of color, the poor and young people. And for the next decade where they live will be shortchanged of certain federal funds. It may change the configuration of congressional districts or cut the number of congressional districts.

This year the presidential election is all about (defeating) Donald Trump. In the Democratic primaries, Biden fared badly. Then, Rep. Jim Clyburn endorsed him on the eve of the South Carolina primary. (Clayburn is the 3rd, highest ranking Democrat in the House. Nancy Pelosi is Speaker and Steny Hoyer is # 2.)

Kamala Harris had dropped out long before that, but within days after Biden's win, other Democrats simply ended their campaigns.

We've got four decades of information about Joe Biden. Less than one Senate term for Kamala Harris. What about the Democratic Party platform? The issues? NOT Trump!

This election should energize us to double-down. To keep tabs on who got elected. Who are their campaign donors? Which pieces of legislation do they author/co-sponsor/support? What do they vote against? Do you agree? If not let them know. What do they issue press releases about? When do they remain silent? Why?

Democracy is not a spectator sport. And not paying attention is a third kind of vote

Gulf of Mexico Coastline Polluted by Oil

Earlier this month, a 5-mile stretch of shoreline on Perdido Key, located west of Pensacola Florida, was despoiled with oil. As of now, the exact source of the oil is unknown. However, what is known: storm surges caused by Hurricane Sally brought major flooding to Pensacola and nearby Alabama in mid-September. Two deaths and \$309 million in damages were reported countywide. Hurricane surges likely stirred up the oil from elsewhere in the Gulf of Mexico.

The Interior Department has been on oil companies to permanently plug thousands of abandoned oil wells since 2010, when the Deepwater Horizon blowout inspired that

(New Nukes, from p. 1) North Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming and Nebraska. Their numbers are governed in part by the 2010 New START treaty with Russia, which is due to expire in February. Russia wants to extend the treaty but the Trump administration has set conditions not accepted by Moscow.

The Trump administration affirmed its commitment to fielding a new generation of ICBMs in a 2018 review of enforcement. The policy aimed to make energy production safer and prevent catastrophic leaks at wells, many of which have been improperly abandoned for decades. However, many today are not even monitored for leaks. See figure (generated 10 years ago) below for general locations of these abandoned oil

An Associated Press investigation found that more than 27,000 abandoned wells in the Gull have been ignored for decades. The well beneath BP's Deepwater Horizon rig was being sealed with cement for temporary abandonment when it blew April 20.



nuclear policy. "The ICBM force is highly survivable against any but a large-scale nuclear attack," the review concluded. "To destroy U.S. ICBMs on the ground, an adversary would need to launch a precisely coordinated attack with hundreds of high-yield and accurate warheads."

The U.S. also is building a new fleet of ballistic missile submarines to replace the current Ohio-class strategic subs; a new long-range nuclearwells on the Gulf coast.

Ten years ago environmental groups welcomed the directive. "This is an important step in cleaning up what has become an offshore dumping ground for the offshore oil and gas industry" said Peter Galvin of the Center for Biological Diversity, adding "old wells CAN and DO leak

capable bomber to replace the B-2 stealth aircraft; a next-generation air-launched nuclear cruise missile; and a new nuclear command and communications system. It also is working on updated warheads, including an ICBM warhead replacement for an estimated \$14.8 billion.

The nuclear modernization program was launched by the Obama administration and has been continued by President Donald Trump.


Jumping forward in time, let's look at 9-11 in New York. After the initial "terrorist" fuss, the word began to slip out about a

Even before WW II, the first pipelines had been begun from Iraq to the sea. The 1930's map on the left shows their paths. The dotted line on that map shows the proposed




pipeline the US was working on with Saudi Arabia.

In Yemen, the discovery of oil there is driving the conflict with the Saudis, who support a government-in-exile that lays claim to significant oil fields.

Popular Uprisings Against Iraqi Gov't

17 years after the US invaded Iraq, things are not going very well. Just last month events were held to celebrate the first anniversary of a mass uprising that took place on October 1. 2019. In cities across Iraq, protests erupted against a government accused of corruption and ignoring the needs of the people. The government responded with a brutal repression that cost the lives of between 500-700 persons.

Still, the protesters won some major victories; they toppled the current government, forcing new elections. Above all, they raised the consciousness of the people to the possibility of real change.

The uprising (some called it a "revolution") was led by young people and the poor, but was joined by middle class and union members. It grew to a massive size, something never seen before in Iraq.

It was a clear rejection of a political system imposed on the nation from outside that was stealing the wealth of the nation for the benefit of foreign interests. People complained of a "Green Zone Regime" of political actors – often exiles put in place by the US. They were facilitating the extraction of resources from the country while, at the same time, the local population was being neglected. 99% of the nation's income is from oil, but that sector employs only 1% of the population. Even in Basra, one of the richest oil-producing areas, most of the population still lacks basic necessities. Most of the people



who have steady jobs work for the government, and the rest scramble to eke out a living. Even farmers are suffering due to imports of food from outside started under the "Oil for Food" program under the pre-war US sanctions.

"We want a country!" and "We want a life!" were some of the popular slogans of the protest. After the destruction of the Iraqi state by the US invasion, reconstruction has not been achieved. The protests weren't so much anti-capitalist or anti-imperialist as they were over "bread and butter" issues that affect the daily lives of the majority of the people.

Along with high levels of unemployment, there is an ongoing atmosphere of violence. The country is "hypermilitarized" by competing militias, and kidnappings and murders are commonplace. This arises not only from the US invasion, but also from the internal war against the rise of ISIS in northern Iraq, and the "proxy war" being carried on in Iraq by Iran and the US. The US assassination of Iranian General Qassem Soleimani upon his arrival at the Baghdad airport is the latest escalation of this conflict.

Though the Iraqi government has asked the US to withdraw its military forces, the US almost certainly wants to hold on to its bases in Iraq as part of its attempts to "contain" Iranian influence in the region. And, of course, to keep Iraqi oil flowing to the US.
