

# 2020: Racism, Repression and Fightback in the USA

For over two months, an uprising against police brutality and white supremacy that followed the murder of George Floyd has persevered in spite of the

violently onesided political repression spearheaded by both the state and the extreme right-wing.

The Alliance for Global Justice (AFGJ) has recently released a new report detailing the various forms in which

political repression of today's anti-racist uprising in the U.S. has manifested itself.

The report discusses findings in four key areas of investigation into deepened political repression of the uprising at the state and societal level: a surge in mass arrests and a significant rise in political imprisonments; an increase in arbitrary detentions and the militarization of streets; deaths caused by use of lethal force; and deaths caused by the ignition of racist violence and rightto "dominate the streets," as President Trump has described.

Since then, militarization of police forces and the encroachment of martial law has enabled the violent repression and

mass politicallymotivated arrests of protestors in many major cities across the country, ranging from a few dozen to over a thousand arrests.

Though statistics on this are very difficult to attain, the National Lawyers Guild

(NLG) has reported on the prominence of many largely arbitrary "protest-related" arrests, including "disorderly conduct," "resisting arrest," and "failure to disperse."

According to the NLG, police across the country have arrested protesters, journalists, (*Cont. on p. 6*)

By late June, protests had emerged in at least 1,700 cities and towns across all 50 states. In response to this widespread unrest, on June 1st, 62,000 National Guard troops mobilized in at least 25 states., working in cooperation with police

## Nuclear Bombs/Accidents Aren't the Only Cause of Ocean's Radioactive Poisoning

By Board member Garv Mever Most people know that the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear reactor meltdown led to the deaths and injuries of thousands of people. Many do not know that this disaster caused the largest accidental source of radionuclides in the ocean, and atmospheric and soil contamination comparable only to the Chernobyl nuclear power plant disaster. Soil contamination caused deleterious effect on stock farming and agriculture, affecting human health.

The peak of the concentrations was approximately one

month after the earthquake, which corresponds with the decision to use seawater to cool the reactors. In terms of radionuclide activities in the surface of the ocean, Fukushima exceeds Chernobyl.

However, radionuclide activities in our oceans is much higher in the North Atlantic. Why??

Until the early 1990s the oceans were used as a gigantic dump for radioactive waste from nuclear power plants. From 1946 to 1993, more than 200,000 **tons** of waste, some of it highly radioactive, was dumped in the oceans. Also, several nuclear subs, with nuclear munitions, were also sunk. More than 90 percent of this nuclear waste came from Britain and the Soviet Union. However, the US dropped more than 90,000 barrels and at least 190,000 cubic meters of radioactive waste in the North Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. "The barrels are averywhere"

"The barrels are everywhere" says ecologist Yannick Rousselet, and "they are rusty and leaking, with radiation clearly elevated." He also said there is "no safe way to lift the rusted barrels," which will lead to contamination of the ocean floor for decades. (*Cont. on p. 7*)

## The Yemen Civil War In A Global Context: The Untold Story

We hear a lot these days of the major humanitarian crisis in Yemen, where as many as 100,000 have died in their civil war, and millions are facing starvation.

The US government bears some responsibility for this; it supports the Saudi aerial bombing campaign with weapons, intelligence, and even in-flight refueling of Saudi attack aircraft.

The US State Dept. claims that the rebel forces in Yemen are Iranian proxies in the battle with Saudi Arabia for regional dominance. Our support for Saudi Arabia's war in Yemen is justified as an extension of the hostile diplomacy of the US toward Iran, which is suffering under heavy US sanctions.

But a recent webinar on the subject paints a very different picture, and shows how the framing of the Yemeni "civil war" is a cover for the real cause of the fighting: who will control, and benefit from, newly discovered oil and natural gas resources. What's the real story?

The Republic of Yemen only came into existence in 1990, with the merger of the Yemen Arab Republic in the north, and the People's Democratic Republic of Yemen in the south. Very soon after that, in 1994, a civil war broke out between the northern faction, who had been a "free market" (if somewhat corrupt) country, and the south, which had been socialist.

The north won, and instituted "structural adjustments" in order to obtain loans from the IMF and World Bank. This was not well received by the majority of the population, who are largely rural subsistence farmers. The military victory of the north also put many southern properties and resources into northern hands.

This led to an indigenous insurgency against the Yemeni government beginning in 2004. It was a broadly based, crossregional alliance called Ansar Allah ("Supporters of God").

One of the main points of the webinar was to point out how, in our Western media, this movement has been demonized and rebranded as "the Houthis," a radical Shi'a group supported by Iran.

In fact, the movement also contains Sunnis as well, who make up nearly two thirds of the population.

The name "Houthi" is taken from one of the leaders of the Ansar Allah movement, Hussein Badreddin al-Houthi, whose name includes the name of his tribe, the Houthi. He was killed by the Yemeni army, along with a number





of his guards, for resisting arrest in 2004. This sparked the insurgency against the government, which has been call the "Houthi" insurgency in the West, to hide the existence of the very broad Ansar Allah movement, of which Hussein was a part.

This "reductive naming" is a verbal device that reduces an entire movement/insurgency to one man, to "minimalize the resistance." In Cuba, the problem was Castro, not





the Cuban Revolution; in Venezuela, the problem is Maduro, not the Venezuelan people; in Bolivia, the problem was Evo Morales, not the poor indigenous majority that elected him to office.

This device has been used very effectively to direct the attention of the US public away from what is really going on in areas where "US (business) interests" are at work behind the scenes. Let's not let it work again in Yemen!

The "real story" is that the majority of the people of

Yemen, a nation of around 20 million mainly poor rural subsistence farmers, are struggling against a corrupt and repressive capitalist government being supported by the

US, Britain, Saudi Arabia (US proxies?), and a ragtag coalition of local states.

In addition to wealth of the newly found oil and natural gas fields, also at stake is the geopolitical crossroads Yemen occupies at the entrance to the Red Sea. Right across the narrow strait to the west, in

Djibouti, military bases are springing up like mushrooms as "the Great Chess Game" continues to play out among world powers.

So the Yemeni people are condemned to pay the price of other nations' political and financial ambitions, to suffering under a brutal aerial bombardment that has no real chance of ending yet another "endless war."

Unfortunately, they have no corporate propaganda machine to tell their side of the story; just us.

legal observers, medics, and bystanders\_alike. Charges range from low-level offenses to federal felonies.

Law enforcement agents continue to exercise deadly force and intimidation against human beings with impunity. Legal observers have reported law enforcement agents attacking people with batons and bicycles, running protestors down with horses and police vehicles, and freely deploying tear gas, pepper spray, rubber and bean bag bullets, and flash-bang grenades.

A body of documented evidence has made evident the serious injuries and fatalities caused by the use of state-sanctioned violence against antiracist protestors and most particularly people of color.

President Trump has also repeatedly encouraged his supporters to take action against protestors in the name of restoring "law and order." By doing so, the administration has strengthened the narrative of neo-fascists by evoking a sense of imminent danger and providing the militant far-right a platform.

The Trump Administration has given the Customs and Border Protection's (CBP) elite force, the Border Patrol Tactical Unit (BORTAC) the green light to enter major cities in order to crack down on protests. BORTAC agents, the "Marine Corps of US federal law enforcement community," are trained to treat civilians as "enemy combatants." The rise in arbitrary detentions and forced disappearances of protestors and people





of color today have made evident the everyday reality undocumented people of color face in the hands of U.S. law enforcement.

It also sheds light on the fundamental role of the U.S. police state: to repress people of color for their actions undertaken in defense of their survival. We recognize that these practices of statesanctioned violence aren't new, and that the repression of anti-racist resistance movements transcends U.S. borders. The intentional and systematic role the U.S. state has played in providing training, sponsorship and arms to right-wing militaries and paramilitaries in the global south is an issue that should concern all of us committed to the anti-racist

movement. From the creation of the School of Americas in

1946, to today's support of right-wing client states and plans for regime change around the world, U.S. foreign policy has facilitated the repression of colonized peoples. Now it's bringing those policies to bear at home as well.

With local, state, and federal law enforcement as well as the militant right-wing making its presence known during this nationwide uprising, the U.S. anti-racist resistance

movement will need more than just its numbers to overcome its repression.

In order to succeed, we need an unwavering commitment to expose human rights violations, and to mobilize against racial oppression and injustice everywhere.

#### Hi everyone,

I grew up in Roseville, where my dad worked for the railroad. I went to Sierra College before moving down to San Jose State, where I earned a BA in Art History. I've been doing artwork since childhood, thanks to a very talented older sister who inspired me.

Being born just after the end of WWII, I grew up playing soldier (along with cowboys and Indians, Tarzan, etc.) with my seven brothers. We lived at the edge of town, and Dry Creek, with all of it's trees and brush along the banks, was our favorite playground.

I became politically aware and active during the Viet Nam war (not *really* a war, since Congress never declared war) in the 1960's, and have been at it ever since. For the last 26+ years, I've been working with the Zapatistas, an indigenous group in Mexico who got fed up with the Mexican government and declared war on it in 1994. They're still there today, no longer a rebel army, but as a well-organized social movement. They control an autonomous area in which they govern themselves. They have their own medical, educational, and legal systems, independent of state and federal laws. Sadly, they continue to be attacked by paramilitary groups even today, but they keep on keepin' on!

That's what we have to do as the Peace Movement. We too have a government that doesn't give a damn about us, and a political system that shuts us out so that it can pander to the rich. If we ever hope to attain peace (as in ending war), we have to recognize and deal with another war, that's invisible and undeclared: the class war.

The people who run our society have tricked us into fighting each other, while they're stealing us blind, and using our nation's wealth to try to rule the world. We have to make peace with ourselves first, and then work together to take our country back from the "elites." Radiation will be absorbed by marine animals, including those caught in fishing nets, and beaches will be contaminated.

"The exact effects of radioactive radiation are extremely difficult to prove" says Rousselet, adding that we must walk away from everything that causes radioactive waste: nuclear power plants, nuclear weapons manufacture, etc.

Until humans can assure proper disposal and storage of nuclear wastes (much of which will remain radioactive for millions of years!), they have no right to continue poisioning our planet!
