Growing Up in Cleveland, Mississippi – Acknowledging the Past

Sacramento Area Peace Action would like to share the memories of a young Michelle Gayle (one of your Board Members, who is still young-at-heart) as part of Black History Month. She was born in Cleveland Mississippi, but left when she was a teenager. Here are a few gut-wrenching reasons why.

Cleveland, located in rural Mississippi, and like many other towns and cities in the South, has been divided for generations. The railroad tracks divided the 12,000 people into a "black-side" and a "white-side" of the town. For numerous decades, blacks attended one high school, and whites another. There were exceptions: sometimes black athletes would be allowed into the white school. Only in the last couple of years have these high schools been replaced by a single high-school, where all children can attend regardless of race. Because of such institutional segregation, both past and present, many blacks either join(ed) the military, or move(d) to Chicago.

Michelle was primarily raised by her grandmother, because her mother was very active in the civil rights movement. So active, that she was chased out of Mississippi by the Klan, who almost killed her with a "brick to the head". Michelle's activism, inspired by her mother's SNCC activism, continues to this day.

The "narrow-mindedness" of Mississippi is what Michelle remembers most, but a couple memories are seared into her consciousness, forever. For example: a young man she knew was lynched (on September 8, 1976), and Michelle has an image of James Calhoun, proudly framed on her wall. Another painful memory: the black valedictorian, who was shot dead on graduation night.

Michelle only lasted a year at her high school, and at the age of 17, had enough and moved away. She occasionally visits, as many family members still live in Mississippi.

Why Does "Progress" Have To Be Paid For With Human Lives?

Though millions of lives have been lost to the brutality of war and imperialism, we often forget that each one is an individual. In this small space, we want to highlight a few of those individuals, to put a



human face on the ongoing human sacrifice.

The first one is Patrice Lumumba, the young 25 year old President of the Congo who was murdered in

1961 by the CIA and other foreign agents. His crime? Wanting to share the wealth his country was producing with of his own people.

The second is Berta Cáceres, a Honduran activist who was killled in 2016 for defending the river that was the lifeblood of her of her small

community. Her opposition to the company wanting to build a dam on their river cost her life. Five years later, the people



who ordered her murder are still free to threaten others who oppose them.

Behind them are the 30,000 who die of hunger every day, the millions killed in endless wars, and the uncounted victims of racism, misogyny, and religious fanaticism. When are we, the good people of this world, going to stop supporting this ongoing crime against humanity?

"What a mess they've left behind!"

Imperialism Has Caused Many World Problems

Many of the today's problems are rooted in the brutal colonial adventures of the past. For example, the borders of all Middle Eastern countries were drawn by Europeans, with no regard for ethnic differences.

In Africa, most of the continent was colonized by Europeans who tried to "whitewash" their wars of conquest by creating the myth of "The White Man's Burden." They imagined that they were doing a favor to the peoples that they conquered, using

artillery and machine guns against natives armed with shields and spears.

Most of the "global south" is poor, not because they lack resources, but because most of their resources have been being plundered by foreign imperial powers for centuries!

The US was a latecomer to the world stage. But after exterminating most Indian tribes, and conquering half of Mexico, they were ready to look abroad. Like the British, they too believed that it was their "Manifest Destiny"

Cuba, the Philippines, and their weaker neighbors to the south laid the foundations of empire, and with the decline of Europe in two World Wars, the US become the imperial global superpower. Today, it's struggling keep that position.

But at what cost? Beyond the vast expense of empire, what is the *moral* cost? How can we proclaim democracy, while denying others their freedom? Now, more than ever, it's time to say "*No!*" to war, and "*Yes!*" to peace.
